**Giant NT boab** grows in stature

OULD this be the Territory's biggest boab? The giant tree in the Cavenagh St car park has been nominated as the NT's biggest boab with the National Register of Big Trees.

The tree has a circumference of 8.58m, is 14m tall and has an average crown spread of 16m

This gives it a big tree total of 396 points, according to the NRBT register.

The points score is determined by adding the circumference, plus the height, plus one-quarter of the average crown spread (all in inches).

The register was developed by Derek McIntosh, from Balgowlah in New South Wales.

Mr McIntosh is as passionate about trees as William Blake, who once said: "The tree which moves some to tears of joy is in the eyes of others only a green thing that stands in the way."

"I get so much enjoyment out of trees," Mr McIntosh said. "Every big tree comes with a family of people who
